

SKY WATCHERS is a feature article on amateur astronomy by Sharon McAuliffe. It is in the August issue of OMNI magazine.

WHAT'S THE BIG BANG by another, more majestic name? According to a June 11 article in the Boston Globe brought to our attention by ATM'er Charlie McDonald, the AAS has announced a contest to come up with a new name for the theory we now call the 'Big Bang.' Astronomer and science writer, Timothy Ferris, dreamed up the idea and will expound on it in the August Issue of S&T. He finds the current term "misleading, ugly and trivializing." It was originally used as a putdown in 1950 by Sir Fred Hoyle, the British cosmologist who espoused the Steady State theory. Carl Sagan, who along with Ferris and 20/20 host Hugh Downs will judge the contest. The winner (no prize, just



fame and glory) will be announced at next January's AAS meeting. Calvin and Hobbes, the cartoon characters have already submitted their entry in a recent strip. ATMOB MEMBER PROFILE...

TED POULOS, outgoing ATMoB Secretary, hails from the Chicago area where as a teenager he learned astronomy by reading books from the local library. making a monthly 30-mile train trip to the Adler Planetarium in Chicago to see the latest sky show, and sending 25 cents each month to S&T to obtain the magazine's current issue. Ted developed interests in other sciences too, particularly chemistry and had quite a laboratory in his basement. It's a wonder he is here today since, like most boys, he loved to experiment with rocket fuels. A chemist by training, his past experience has been as a project manager for a company that made computerized optical emission spectrographs used for chemical analysis. He now does technical writing as a consultant from his home in Brookline: In 1982, Ted built a backyard an 8 x 8 ft. observatory with a 6 ft. wood ribbed and fibergisss dome to house a C8. His favorite objects to observe are globular clusters. Loving hi-tech things, he longs for a completely computerized scope equipped with a CCD imaging system. Ted's hobbies, in addition to astronomy, are: electronics, computers, bicycle riding, and reading books on science. He has been an ATMoB member since 1981 and, as secretary for the past three years, has enlarged the club's 'bulletin' into the STAR FIELDS newsletter. To satisfy an innate passion to share science with others, he volunteers at the Hayden Planetarium and is an Exhibit Interpreter at the Museum of Science.

ASTRO-TRIVIA...

GALILEO'S TELESCOPE had an aperture of 16 mm and a focal length of 960 mm for a f/ratio of 60. It used a diverging lens for an eyeplece that produced a non-inverted image and a 20X magnification. The field of view was about one degree, but only about one-third of the field could be seen at one time-9 arcminutes.
