## A Letter to Sky \& Telescope...

THE FOLLOWING is a letter sent from ATMoB member Ed Los, to Sky Publishing.

After twenty-four years of reading your magazine, I have decided not to renew my subscription when it expires this year. Instead, I am spending extra money on a technical membership in the Astronomical Society of the Pacific. I am hoping that their publications will be at a much higher technical level than your magazine.

I believe the continued vitality of amateur and professional astronomy in this country depends on closer collaboration between these two groups. I
see signs of such collaborations in Europe, but my recent attendance at the AAS meeting in California underscores the fact that professionals in this country speak a different language and have different concerns from amateurs.

The "essential" magazine in astronomy that I am looking for will encourage more bridges between amateurs and professionals and will seek to further the technical education that many amateurs already possess. A magazine that glorifies meteorite bandits or romances between astronomers does not meet these goals. I encourage you to rethink your editorial policies and restore "Sky and Telescope to the technical reputation that it enjoyed in the past.

## An Invitation to the ATMoB...

DR. ALEXANDER Tikhonovich Basilevsky, planetary scientist for the former Soviet Union, will be speaking at the September 3rd, monthly meeting of Skyscrapers, Inc. at the Seagrave Observatory at $8: 00 \mathrm{pm}$.

Basilevsky is currently a participating planetary geologist on the Magellan mission at Brown University. He received his Ph.D. in Geochemistry in 1969 and his Doctor of Science in Geochemistry and Planetary Sciences in 1986, both from the Vernadsky Institute in Moscow.

Past accomplishments include involvement in the selection of lunar landing sites for the Lunokhod and Luna missions, and eight other space missions.

Presently, he is the Chief of the Laboratory of Comparative Planetary Sciences of the Vernadsky Institute of the Russian Academy of Sciences, has very large business cards, and is involved in the selection of landing sites for future Mars missions.

## Meteor Madness...

IN RESPONSE to local media coverage of the Perseid meteor shower, an estimated two hundred and fifty visitors flocked to the ATMoB clubhouse in Westford, MA. to observe the annual event on August 11.

Ted Poulos, one of twelve ATMoB members in attendance, observed twenty two meteors beteen 9:30 and 11:30 p.m.. They were bright and left persistent trails. Ed Dougherty described the event as "Slightly better than a typical Perseid shower.".

The lower than expected number of meteors did not dampen the crowd's enthusiasm as they covered the lawn and looked at the sky.

DENNIS MILON reports "thirty per hour" was the best meteor rate seen from Gary Walker's dark site observatory in Rumford, N.H. According to Gary, most of the meteors were first magnitude or brighter.

Near by at Mario Motta's observatory, a fear of clouds drove a group of Perseid observers
to points North in an attempt to find greener observing grass...

IN A reoccurring theme of recent years, Saturday afternoon clouds gave way to clear skies in the early evening, at the 58th annual Stellafane Convention held August 13 and 14 in Springfield, Vt.

The clearing took place during the Key Note address of famed Association of Lunar and Planetary Observer (ALPO) member and planetary observer Donald Parker.

Walter Scott Houston, the evening's first speaker, stressed the importance of individual members to a club. He took the audience on a trip back in Springfield Telescope Makers history to speak on the contributions of past heralded and, in particular, unheralded members.

Parker's presentation centered on the importance of amateur contributions to planetary astronomy. A CCD zealot, he extolled and illustrated the technology by contrasting astrophotographs with CCD images of the same objects.

The talk, sprinkled with wit and humor, encouraged all amateurs with a desire to make contributions to planetary astronomy, to become involved with ALPO. Regular observations and recordings whether CCD, photographic or drawings are a valued resources funneled to the professional community via ALPO.

ROBERT ROYCE'S six inch, achromatic, f/15 refractor took first place honors in the compound telescope category of optical competition at this year's Stellafane convention. Royce is an ATMoB member from Northford, CT.
